By-laws for public input

Kingborough Council has invited public submissions on four proposed by-laws, including parking by-laws, following the passing of a motion of intent on June 7 to make by-laws by absolute majority.

Council's General Manager Gary Arnold published a notice of the proposed by-laws, pursuant to section 157 of the *Local Government Act 1993*, in *The Mercury* on June 26.

The proposed new rules include a parking by-law:
"That there is a system and guidelines in place to control commercial activities.
"Those vehicles being driven and parked within parking areas are doing so in an orderly manner to avoid confusion and conflict.
"That public parking areas are being used for their intended purpose.
"That there is an adequate enforcement system in place."

The proposed new laws also include a parks, recreation and natural areas by-law:

"That parks, recreation, natural areas and council land are used in such a manner as not to create a public health nuisance.
"That there is an adequate enforcement system in place."

The proposed by-laws also include a marine facilities by-law that includes:
"That there is a system in place to control any commercial activities that may be conducted from marine facilities; and
"That there is an adequate enforcement system in place."

The intended by-laws to be created are titled:

- Marine Facilities By-law No.1 of 2021
- Health and Environmental Services By-law No.2 of 2021
- Parks, Recreation and Natural Areas By-law No.3 of 2021
- Roads and Parking By-law No.4 of 2021

Acting Mayor of Kingborough, Cr Jo Westwood said in media release on June 26, the proposed by-laws provide for the health, safety and welfare of the community.

"Most of our operations as a council are regulated or guided by a range of related legislation, regulations, by-laws and policies," Acting Mayor Westwood said.

"These ensure the interests of the community are represented and provide for good governance within our municipality.

"These proposed by-laws will govern how community members operate and use marine facilities, protect the community in matters relating to public and environmental health, regulate the use of recreational facilities and ensure that roads and parking areas are appropriate."

O'Byrne steps down

Tasmania's recently elected Opposition Leader, Member for Franklin, David O'Byrne MP has resigned from his leadership role as an investigation takes place into allegations he sexually harassed a junior employee over a decade ago.

The alleged harassment took place while the complainant worked for Mr O'Byrne at the Liquor, Hospitality and Miscellaneous Union.

Mr O'Byrne delivered a statement to the media on June 30.

"I have read today's media reports concerning a complaint which has been made to the Tasmanian Labor Party Secretary, which will be the subject of an investigation," said Mr O'Byrne.

"Whilst I have not yet received a copy of the complaint, I believe it necessary to publicly respond to some of the matters reported today.

"I acknowledge that my behaviour did not meet the standards I would expect of myself.

"I also acknowledge I have let down my wife and family.

"At the time of the reported events, I genuinely believed the kiss and text

exchanges to be consensual, however, I now understand that this was not the case.

"The matter has caused me to reflect deeply on the matter of consent and I've come to appreciate why this person concerned says our interactions was not consensual.

"I have written to her to offer my unreserved apology for the unwanted contact and text.

"I genuinely thank her for having the strength to bring this issue to light and I also thank other women who have advocated and spoken about their personal experiences, to inform the current national conversation about consent.

"I will be standing aside as Opposition Leader today, for the duration of the investigation into this matter."

Member for Braddon, Anita Dow MP has taken on the role of Acting Labor Leader.

Ms Dow is a former Mayor of Burnie who previously worked as a registered nurse and is currently also involved in agriculture with her family.

Jan went on to Casey and Mawson stations and Macquarie Island, conducting maintenance and repairs.

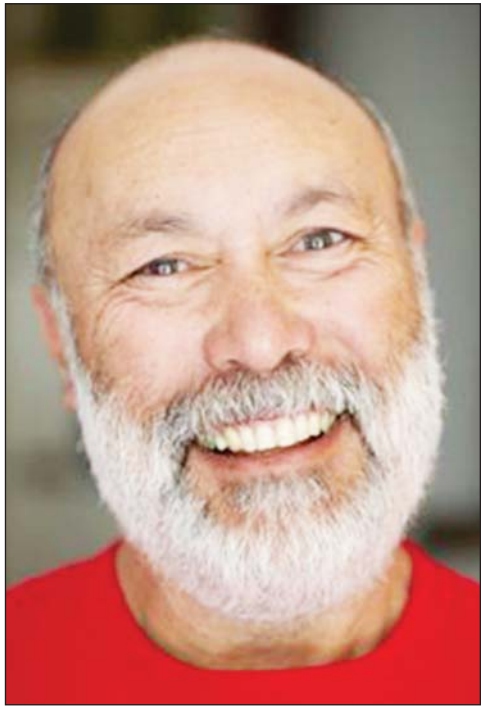
Jan worked in the Australian Antarctic Division from 1991 to 2014.

Campaign to remove firearms

Crime Stoppers Tasmania is urging Tasmanians to take advantage of a national amnesty and surrender unwanted firearms, without fear of penalty, as part of a National Illicit Firearms Campaign launched on July 1.

Crime Stoppers is partnering with Tasmania Police to help answer questions from the community and explain how and where to safely dispose of a firearm.

Crime Stoppers Tasmania Chair, David Daniels, said there are around 250,000 long arm and 10,000 handguns in Australia, either unregistered or unable to be registered, as well as prohibited accessories such as silencers and ammunition.

"The focus of the national amnesty is to reduce the number of unwanted, unregistered and illicit firearms in the community by encouraging people to do their bit by handing in a firearm so that it doesn't fall into the wrong hands," said Mr Daniels.

"Whether it's an inherited family heirloom, an old gun

left in the back of the shed, received from a friend or family, or a firearm legally registered but no longer needed, they all remain a potential risk to community safety.

"An amnesty provides opportunity to safely dispose of a firearm without cost or penalty."

Crime Stoppers Tasmania said 'grey market' firearms are those that should have already been handed in or registered and are not typically kept by people with any criminal intent, however they can end up in the hands of people who plan to use them for criminal purposes.

"The added challenge that comes with grey market firearms is that when they become lost or stolen an owner is less likely to report this to police because they worry about being prosecuted for having an unregistered firearm to begin with, so handing it in for destruction removes that burden," said Mr Daniels.

The amnesty also provides opportunity for people to register their firearm or apply for an appropriate licence.

Affordable housing support increased

On Friday, July 2, Tasmanian Parliament passed legislation to help first home owners and reduce stamp duty enacted through the Treasury Miscellaneous (Cost of Living and Affordable Housing Support) Bill 2021. The passing of the Bill includes;

- Increasing the First Home Owners Grant from \$20,000 to

- \$30,000, backdated to 1 April 2021 until 30 June 2022;
- Increasing the threshold for the 50 per cent stamp duty concession to apply to purchases up to \$500,000 for Tasmanians buying their first home and pensioners downsizing their family home, which will be backdated to 16 March 2021;
- Reducing land tax costs by increasing thresholds, allowing payment by instalments on accounts over \$500 and reducing interest applied to deferred payments; and
- Capping the Motor Accidents Insurance Board duty as part of our new quarterly vehicle registration payment option.

Monitoring behaviour at Kingston Park

Kingborough Council has installed 18 extra security cameras in Kingston Park and upgraded security cameras at the Kingborough Community Hub in an effort to address anti-social behaviour.

In a combined press release on July 1, Kingston Police Inspector Mark Burke and Acting Mayor of Kingborough, Jo Westwood, reassured the community that council and police are working together to address anti-social behaviour occurring at Kingston Park.

"I have become increasingly concerned with the number of conversations I have had with community members reporting bad behaviour in Kingston Park after dark," Cr Westwood said.

"To protect the community, council has installed 18 extra security cameras in the park as well as upgraded the security cameras at the Community Hub.

"We have contracted a private security team to patrol the area twice every night.

"We have tasked staff with cleaning up any mess left from the night before, but this isn't sustainable over the long-term and it's disappointing that it has come to this.

"We are in the process of transitioning our Community Services team to the Kingborough Community Hub which will help build ties with our young people as well as provide a stronger day time staff presence at the park.

"I do not want anti-social behaviour to become a regular problem in the park.

"Council takes this very seriously and that's why I have met with Inspector, Mark Burke from Kingston Police, to make sure we are working together on this issue."

Inspector Burke said police patrols have been increased in the area.

"I'd like to reassure the Kingborough community that we are here for them and that there is a police presence in Kingborough at night time," Inspector Burke said.

"Although the station might not be open, I want to assure the community that there are police patrols through Kingborough throughout the evening.

"If anyone witnesses any serious anti-social behaviour anywhere in the community, please call the 131444 or if it's an emergency 000."

Election inquiry passes Upper House

There is a potential win on the way for transparency and accountability in Tasmania, after Independent and Labor Members of Tasmania's Upper House passed a motion to establish a Joint Select Committee, with broad terms of reference to inquire into the conduct of the 2021 State elections.

The motion passed the Upper House, eight votes to three, on Tuesday, June 29, with opposition from Liberal Members defeated.

Independent Member for Nelson, Meg Webb tabled a Notice of Motion to establish the Committee on June 22. "Support for this motion, is a win for accountability, transparency and a demonstrates a willingness to strengthen our democratic institutions" Ms Webb said.

"It was particularly significant that all Independent Members voted in support of the motion, as well as the Labor Members of the Legislative Council.

"This motion squarely prioritises the public interest over political self-interest."

The *Kingborough Chronicle* wrote to elected local

members of Parliament on June 23, after Independent Member for Nelson, Meg Webb, tabled a Notice of Motion to establish the Committee.

"Do you agree Tasmania's Parliament should put in place a routine practice of conducting a Parliamentary review or inquiry after each election (as routinely done in other jurisdictions)?"

A spokesperson responded on behalf of Liberal Members Elise Archer MP, Jacqui Petrusma MP, Nic Street MP and Madeleine Ogilvie MP.

"The Tasmanian Electoral Commission and the Electoral Commissioner already have statutory responsibilities for the independent and impartial conduct of elections and referendums under the *Electoral Act 2004*.

"As there is already an impartial framework in place for conducting, administering and reviewing elections within Tasmania, the establishment of a Parliamentary Committee to enquire and report on the same thing would be duplication and unnecessary, and a waste of public resources."

However, Ms Webb MLC said the Tasmanian community deserves to have confidence in electoral processes and to know that their Parliament is proactively working to deliver that confidence.

"This Committee, if supported in the Lower House, will provide a forum for people to have a voice, through asking questions, raising concerns and providing evidence," stated Ms Webb.

"The Gutwein Liberal Government now has the opportunity to 'walk the walk and talk the talk' on accountability and transparency.

"I would hope it will be willing to participate in the Joint Select Committee rather than block this standard Parliamentary process.

"Governments of all political stripes in other states and in our Federal Parliament support and participate in similar routine election reviews.

"This motion asks all Members of Parliament to put partisan tribalism aside, and instead don the one set of colours that is Tasmania's democracy."

Smarter waste for Kingborough

The Waste Smart Kingborough project by Sustainable Living in Kingborough (SLiK) is a partnership with Kingborough Council and Fika Café at Kingston Beach.

SLiK worked closely with Mel Staples from Kingborough Council on the concept and then obtained a grant from Kingborough Council.

SLiK has used the grant money and matching funds to hire for a one year period a set of two FOGO (Food Organics Garden Organics) bins which will be collected by the company Veolia weekly.

The purpose of these bins is to collect the compostable takeaway coffee cups and other food takeaway packaging, which Fika is providing to its customers.

SLiK has made up some educational signage which is placed on the bins informing the customers why the compostable takeaway cups must not go in either the landfill or recycle bins that are provided already on the street by council.

The need for the project is in response to a bin audit by council conducted by council last year whereby it was found that there was confusion among the customers of takeaway drinks as to which bin was appropriate, and that most were ending up in the recycle bin.

Because compostable packaging cannot be recycled the entire contents of the recycle bin were deemed contaminated and therefore going to landfill.

The compostable takeaway cups that were being placed in the landfill bin have a similarly disastrous outcome, as the compostable packaging becomes anaerobic when squashed in landfill creating methane gas, which is 10 times more toxic than carbon dioxide and again an outcome which SLiK aims to provide some education on.

Clare Glade-Wright, a spokesperson for SLiK said "SLiK are hoping that this bin trial may also lead to the council deciding that further FOGO bins can be provided elsewhere around the municipality, even if it just one café at a time."

"The food providers are doing the right thing by switching to compostable packaging and now we need to step up to the plate and provide the correct bins for the packaging, otherwise it was pointless for the food provider to switch in the first place."

The Waste Smart Kingborough project is expected to divert 25,000 litres of compostable material from landfill and prevent recycling bins from being contaminated in the area.

The Kingborough Acting Mayor, Jo Westwood said

Kingborough Council was committed to reducing the amount of waste going to landfill.

"As well as reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill, council also wants to improve our community's access to information and resources.

"That's why this month we are beginning our 'No Waste Nothing' campaign which features a character, Mamma Rosa, in a series of videos highlighting great waste reduction tips.

"Mamma Rosa is played by comedian Roseo Kokkoris a Tasmanian Actor with Italian origins who has a family inspired love for not wasting anything.

"This month is Plastic Free July, so council is promoting a video which aims to encourage, through humour, more recycling of our soft plastics."

Celebrating Madge's 90th birthday

Margate resident and local history author Madge Lowe celebrated her 90th birthday with family and friends at Wrest Point on May 28, 2021.

Many speeches were given, including one from close friend John Richmond.

"We would like to congratulate you on the occasion of your 90th birthday and wishing you and your husband Byron many more happy years ahead," said Mr Richmond.

"Your life has been one of long and loving service to your community which few could equal.

"You have always been closely involved with friends and family and are a very familiar figure in Margate, and your garden is much admired.

"It all started years ago when you learned the piano at a very early age and you soon put your skills to good use playing at school and local concerts.

"This went on to include end of war concerts, Empire Day and various parades and other celebrations.

"After leaving school you took up a position at Nettlefolds in the spare parts department and served there for a number of years.

"There was always plenty other things to do such as helping mum and dad on the farm, but still you found time to get a local club group going and play the organ at the local Methodist Sunday school.

"Madge married Byron in 1954, a long and very happy relationship which over the years has brought much pleasure and joy to both parties.

"Together you shared many common interests, family, friends, gardening, overseas travel and a love of country life.

"Madge made many friends playing and entertaining on the cruise ships, sometimes mixing with the rich and famous.

"When Madge got up to play, everyone there stood up and applauded, and the song requests came in one after another, such happy memories.

"Later on, Madge and a few friends got together and formed a lively little musical group of local entertainers calling themselves the Melody Makers.

"They were a popular group and performed at various local functions.

"Madge took up a clerical position working at the Treasury Building in Hobart from 1978 to 1989 while Byron worked at the local Brookfield Estate for 27 years, followed by another 17 in the Transport Department," noted Mr Richmond.

"In 1992 an event occurred which was to have a profound effect on Madges life thereafter.

"A skid on gravel coming down the hill towards the bridge at Lune River badly damaged her car when it hit the bridge post.

"Worst of all, Madge was seriously injured and several of her face bones were broken.

"After six and a half weeks in surgery at St Helens hospital, Madges face was patched up with screws and plates.

"The doctors did a wonderful job leaving no evidence at all of the injury.

"Laying in the hospital for three weeks gave Madge time to think about her friends and the many folk living around Margate who had family stories to tell.

"Not much had been written down previously about the Channel area, so almost immediately Madge

decided if it hadn't been done before, then she was the one to do it.

"So with lots of patience and skill Madge went from door to door, street to street, village to village, speaking to thousands of people getting down their memories and gathering up their stories.

"Little did she know at the beginning what a herculean task she had taken on, but eventually the task was completed and now we have the result; a very fine record of pioneering life in early Margate and the surrounding districts in six books.

"Later followed talks to school children about her books and life experiences with some of her stories appearing in the newspapers.

"Never one to let the grass grow underneath her feet, Madge's next project was the Kingston Concert Party which she ran at the Redwood Road Hall for about 15 years, playing the piano.

"This was a great success and brought many happy folk together to sing and join in the fun.

People also came in from the nursing homes and when that wasn't possible, the concert party would go out to visit them.

"Madge was nominated for the Order of Australia, which she didn't receive but she must have got fairly high on the list with an invitation to Government House and a chat with Governor Sir Guy Green," noted Mr Richmond.

"Madge also received an award from the Kingborough Council in recognition of her outstanding historical and community work.

"Well done Madge, your time in this world has been very well spent."

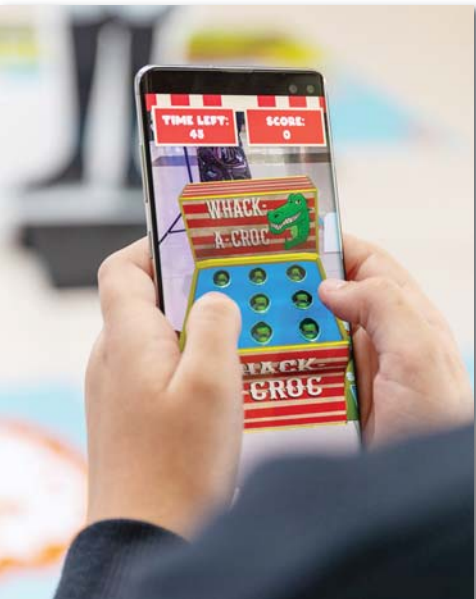

Meet the Candidates

Kingborough Council by-election for Mayor and Councillor



The *Kingborough Chronicle* wrote to all candidates in the upcoming Kingborough Council by-election for the positions of Mayor and Councillor.

The below questions came from the Kingborough community to help learn more about potential candidates on matters important to the local community.

The questions sent to all candidates were:

1. What would you like to improve for Kingborough?
2. What would you like to keep the same and maintain for Kingborough?
3. How important is improving local roads and properly fixing potholes to you?
4. How should traffic flow be managed on the Channel Highway (Kingston CBD) once it's redeveloped?
5. What is your view on current police levels in Kingston and the wider Kingborough areas?

All candidates were invited to answer the community questions, below were the candidates that responded in time.

David Bain Councillor candidate

1. We need to create a municipality with adequate facilities and amenities, and the provision of safe, secure and connected communities.
Continue to improve on the basics, better roads and decent footpaths, connecting shared paths, contemporary playgrounds and quality public toilets.
On a larger scale we need to work closely with State and Federal Government in areas such as traffic congestion, public transport, health services and sensible housing development and associated infrastructure.
2. I believe Kingborough is a great place to live and raise a family, with so many things right on our doorstep including inviting beach precincts, great sporting facilities, parks and playgrounds, tracks, and open space for exercise or to take the dog.
It is these elements of liveability that I really appreciate and would like to maintain and improve on for Kingborough.
3. A priority for me as Councillor would be to create neighbourhoods that we can be proud of.
Having road, footpath and track infrastructure to quality standards is essential in trying to reach this outcome.
4. I think the message from the community has been that people want a vibrant, functioning central Kingston, and that means converting the main street by widening footpaths, narrowing the road, and building a safer pedestrian crossing.
These changes, along with improved shared path connections and potentially relocating bus stops, would aid in managing traffic flow.
5. With an increase in population, there is a need to provide the adequate infrastructure and services to provide for this.
We need to be engaging with the State Government about new services that are required.
A priority should be an emergency services hub in Kingborough, which includes enhanced ambulance services, enhanced firefighting services, and a 24/7 police presence.
This will lead to creating a more inviting and sociable Kingborough.

Sue Bastone Mayor candidate

1. I would like to improve the layout of greater Kingston.
It is currently a hodge-podge of disconnected shopping and commercial areas.
A priority for me would be to employ a strategic planner for our planning department, whose job would be to create a cohesive master plan for Kingston for the next 50 years.
To be proactive, rather than trying to retrofit and play catch-up.
2. The amazing rate of volunteerism and community spirit, the caring attitude of the community towards others, our landcare groups who care for the environment and our amazing community service department on council.

3. Extremely important.
No matter where you live, you need roads and footpaths that are easily traversed.
Living in the country we seem to notice the potholes in the road and when I have been door knocking I have noticed the poor state of some of our footpaths.
We all need to notify council if we notice work that needs doing.
4. Once the redevelopment of the Channel Highway is complete, the road will be much narrower, with a dedicated cycleway and wider footpaths to allow for tree planting and outdoor dining.
There will be traffic calming humps and the bus stops relocated, which will make it easier to choose another route rather than slow so much.
We can also lower the speed limit on the Channel Highway stretch to 20km.
5. It is time Kingston is stopped being treated as the small holiday area that it once was and have a manned police station at least from 6am to 10pm, if it isn't possible to have 24 hour service.
Yet another instance of the need for ongoing communication with State Government.

Di Carter Councillor candidate

1. I want Kingborough to thrive, keep the community at heart and not leave people behind in the wake of the growth and development of our wonderful municipality.
I am an inclusion champion, which means I will be a voice for all people, including older people, people with disability, culturally and linguistically diverse people to have their needs met.
2. I agree with the people I have met while door knocking who have said that Kingborough Council is doing a great job removing rubbish, upgrading stormwater drains, investing in parks and playgrounds and other community facilities.
3. As a car driver, cyclist and walker, I know how dangerous potholes can be, so maintaining infrastructure assets is always a key responsibility and priority of our local council.
Short-term and long-term plans using detailed financial and asset planning are vital in improving our roads and bridges to allow safe access throughout our wonderful community.
4. A 40km speed limit would be advisable on the soon to be resurfaced road.
Clear signage, improved sight lines, and disabled parking spots, along with dedicated bike pathways and another crossing or overpass for pedestrians will create a safer and more user-friendly precinct connection between Channel Court, Kingston Park and Kingston Plaza.
Diverting Kingston Park traffic away from the main street is already improving traffic flow and developing a new bus interchange will give better and safer access to its users.
5. I have talked to Tasmania Police about 24/7 coverage for Kingston and am assured that there is continuous response coverage and on-call arrangement when the Kingston and Woodbridge police stations are not staffed.
I understand that 24/7 presence of police at the stations is not currently viable nor necessary, but I believe that residents can be assured that public safety is a priority and that further back-up is also provided by the Road and Public Service teams as another quick additional response when required.

Gideon Cordover Mayor candidate

1. I would like a street tree strategy, an aquatic centre for the Kingborough Sports Precinct, and a net-zero emissions council.
I'd like covered bus shelters with digital displays that tell when your next bus is coming plus more frequent and reliable public transport.
2. I would like to keep our native vegetation, our remnant forest, our beautiful views of kunanyi and the Channel, and that feeling of being in a beautiful, laid back and caring community.
3. Very important.

4. CBDs are for people, not for cars.
From Times Square in New York to Elizabeth Street Mall in Hobart, once you make places clean, green and walkable with water features, trees, separated cycleways and rapid public transport, it attracts people to stop, stick, stay and spend at our local businesses.
This is more comfortable for the community and better for business.
It's a win-win.
Traffic can then zip around the CBD via the Huon Highway and the outlet without getting slowed down by the newly activated, green and welcoming CBD streetscape.
 5. Keeping our community safe is far more complicated than simply adding more police.
We live in one of the safest communities in Australia despite having a relatively small police presence.
Other places have far more police on the beat and yet have far higher crime rates.
It is simplistic to think that more police equals less crime when, in fact, more employment, more health-care, more passive surveillance, more night-lighting and more close-knit neighbours is what results in less crime.
We need diversion programs, justice reinvestment, activities for teenagers, social workers, mental health care.
I will work closely with our Kingborough Community Safety Committee to find out areas of concern and share ideas for safety improvements.
- ### Flora Fox Mayor candidate
1. I advocate continuous improvements to long-term strategies.
These strategies include planning, infrastructure provision and maintenance, climate change adaptation, environmental protection, and social interaction.
 2. I am pleased that council has long-term strategies in place, to provide value for your rates, a healthy, socially inclusive and connected community.
 3. Council has long-term strategies for building and maintaining roads, bridges, footpaths, walkways, stormwater, parks, playgrounds, and community facilities.
A procedure exists for fixing potholes and local roads in a timely and efficient manner.
Continuous review of these strategies ensures they reflect changing conditions and community needs.
Additionally, plans exist for council to respond to emergencies such as floods or fires.
 4. The CBD will be accessible to traffic from all directions by the ring-road route of Beach Road, Church Street, Freeman Street and John Street.
Council will make Kingston's CBD a low-traffic, pedestrian-friendly precinct with convenient access to car parking and the bus.
Decades of community consultation has led to this concept.
 5. Kingborough is a relatively safe community.
Council provides well managed parks, playgrounds, sporting, and community facilities to promote positive interactions for all age groups.
Kingborough's population growth has justified the addition of more police officers this week.

Clare Glade-Wright Mayor and Councillor candidate

1. I have broken my vision down into three categories, thriving people, thriving economy and thriving environment.

 2. We need to keep as much of the zoned low-density residential areas as possible under the interim planning scheme.

Kingborough Council by-election for Mayor and Councillor

Kate Lucas Councillor candidate

1. Kingborough's population is growing fast but infrastructure lags behind.

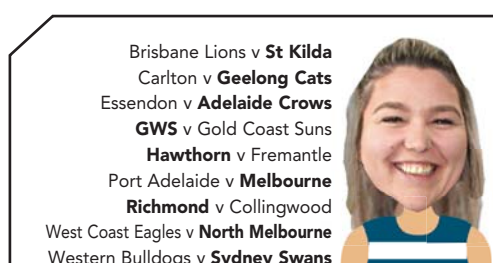

Riley Fenn’s gold medal

Local 14-year-old gymnast Riley Fenn recently returned from the Australian National Gymnastics Championships after winning gold on the pommel horse and finishing ninth overall in the Level 7 Open competition.

Riley is the first MAG gymnast to bring home gold for Tasmania and his dream is to one day make the World Championship.

“Being my first Australian championship, this year’s nationals was a huge success,” Riley commented.

“Especially winning the first gold medal in men’s artistic gymnastics (MAG) for Tasmania ever, feels exhilarating.

“I feel like all the years and effort I’ve put into the sport has finally paid off and shown as a result.

“The journey isn’t over yet and I’m looking to make a big name for myself in the near future.”

It was also the first time that multiple MAG gymnasts have bought home medals from the National Championships with Ethan Loring also earning a spot on the podium.

Riley hopes his journey will take him to the highest level in men’s gymnastics, recognising that it will take an “extreme amount of hard work”.

“In gymnastics, some of my goals are to represent my nation at the world championships and the Olympic games,” stated Riley.

“I would have to raise my hours from 20 hours a week to around the 30 mark when I’m 18 and out of school.”

Despite the challenges, Riley finds joy in training, as well as being surrounded by great people, including his friends and the coaches.

“Gymnastics is just as hard on your body as it can be your brain,” explained Riley.

“What I find most challenging about gymnastics is the mental blocks.

“In men’s gymnastics when you are at the senior level, the skills you perform begin to get a lot harder compared to a junior, which requires strength, flexibility, natural ability and above all confidence.

“Confidence is key to learning new skills to add into your routines that can result in higher scores in competitions which will lead to success in the future.”

Having begun gymnastics in 2016 at age nine, Riley was already making an impression after a short time, placing equal first as State Champion at Level 3 and winning MAG gymnast of the year in 2017.

After reaching Level 5 in 2019, Riley again placed first at the State Championships.

Riley’s mother Isabel was over the moon with her son’s achievement and has positive hopes for his future.

“I am so proud of all Riley’s achievements,”

remarked Isabel.

“What I hope for Riley’s future is that he continues to do things that make him happy and have no regrets.

“I will continue to support him in any decisions he makes.

“I am forever grateful to the people who recognise Riley’s ability and potential and want to support his sporting prowess.

“I’d like to say a special thank you to Lars Becker, Kodee Voss and Oliver Dalco for all your great coaching, guidance and support you’ve given Riley over the years.”

Gymnastics has become a part of life for the family over the previous years, with Isabel and Riley needing to balance gymnastics with other commitments.

“The gym gives family routine along with my other children’s sporting commitments,” said Isabel.

“I have become a highly organised sole parent.

“Riley is very focused and he is very organised in his daily life.

“He coordinates school, part-time work and gymnastics.” Riley is inspired to continue with the intense commitment due to his love of the sport.

“I love all aspects of the sport and work my butt off every session and have been enjoying it to this very day,” Riley declared.
