Alignment on Antarctic position

Federal member for Franklin Julie Collins MP said the Prime Minister has been sitting on a secret report for two years regarding plans to move Australian Antarctic Division (ADD) staff out of Kingborough and into Macquarie Point in Hobart.

"Scott Morrison must come clean on his plan to move the Australian Antarctic Division," said Ms Collins in a Facebook post on March 25.

"He has been sitting on a secret report for two years proposing to move these jobs out of Kingborough but is still yet to detail promised plans to ensure the community is not left worse off.

"This says it all about how much Scott Morrison cares about jobs in regional Tassie."

Meanwhile Senator Eric Abetz is also against shifting the AAD headquarters from Kingston to Hobart as his Coalition colleagues consider the move.

"Moving the Australian Antarctic Division from Kingston into Hobart would be a retrograde step," Senator Abetz said in a social media post.

"I will continue fighting to stop this expensive and unnecessary move."

In a joint media release with Senator Carol Brown on March 25, Ms Collins MP said "Kingborough deserves better".

"Scott Morrison spent hundreds of thousands on a secret report on moving the AAD but is keeping the people of Kingborough in the dark on what it says.

"Despite this, Senate Estimates recently heard the Morrison Government has well advanced plans to progress the AAD's move from Kingston to Macquarie Point.

"The secret plans are based on a KPMG report commissioned by the federal government to progress the AAD's move but is being kept hidden from the public.

"Despite these plans to move the AAD, Scott Morrison has detailed no alternative public sector economic and employment footprint for Kingborough.

"It is shocking these kinds of decisions are being made behind closed doors when the AAD's presence in Kingborough means so much to the local community and its economy.

"Scott Morrison must immediately release the report so Tasmanians can be confident any move represents value for money.

"This will be a cruel shock to the Kingborough community who were given a promise in the Hobart City Deal that the public sector jobs in Kingston would be maintained if the AAD was moved.

"Scott Morrison is putting the horse before the cart on the AAD move and Kingborough deserves better."

The Hobart City Deal report, dated February 2019, stated:

"The existing public sector economic and employment footprint in Kingborough will be maintained while also exploring opportunities to expand the existing footprint."

COVID cases climb in Kingborough

Cases of COVID-19 in Kingborough have been climbing, with consequential impacts on individuals, families, local schools, businesses and sports teams.

The latest *Weekly Surveillance Report* published by Tasmania's Department of Health, for the reporting week ending March 26, COVID-19 case numbers increased in Kingborough, recorded 713 new cases compared with 636, 430 and 421 new cases in each of the previous four weeks respectively.

An increased rate of PCR testing was undertaken in Kingborough during the same reporting week, with 764 PCR tests performed, an increase on the number of tests (558) performed the previous week.

Tasmanian hospital admissions due to COVID-19 increased to 28, compared with 20 in the previous reporting week.

Sadly, another person died in hospital, with COVID-19 recoded as the cause or contributing factor.

There has also been an increase in COVID-19 PCR test positive results

seen over the past four weeks.

In southern Tasmania, 22 per cent of the 5929 COVID-19 PCR tests undertaken in the reporting week ending March 26 returned a positive result, compared with 21, 15 and 11 per cent testing positive in the previous four weeks respectively.

The *Weekly Surveillance Report* describes the trends in COVID-19 case notifications since the lifting of Tasmanian border restrictions on December 15, 2021.

As of Sunday, April 3, the total active case numbers in Tasmania had reached 13,076, with 7112 active cases in the southern part of the State. Daily hospital case numbers have continued to climb.

Royal Hobart Hospital escalation

COVID-19 escalation management plans were escalated at two Tasmanian hospitals on Friday, April 1, due to the number of COVID-positive inpatients and an increasing level of COVID-related staff absences impacting general operations.

Council has recently been made aware the Tasmania Police
have granted a licence to deal firearms from a property direct-
ly next door to Margate Primary School, in the former Church.

prevent this activity.
We were not asked for any input into the process of grant-
ing the licence.
There are community interest tests in relation to granting of
licences to sell alcohol or operate gaming venues near facilities
like schools and child care centres, but not for firearms.
On behalf of the community I have written to the Minister
for Police, Fire and Emergency Management, Jacquie
Petrusma, raising our concerns about the inappropriateness
of this location.
I have asked the Minister to have this decision reviewed,
as well as considering a more robust system of approval for
granting of firearm licences in the future.
I do hope that the State Government takes notice of our
community's views and has this decision overturned.

Council's new complaints management system

Dear Editor,
Kingborough Ratepayers Association Inc (KRAI) congratulates
Kingborough Council (KC) on the adoption of a new Complaints
Management Policy on March 21.
The policy is based on a best-practice council complaints
handling system developed by the Victorian Ombudsman
and details how complaints will be managed in a consistent
way across Council's operations.
What this means is that now KC acknowledges that dealing
with complaints is a core part of Council business.
The policy encourages people to contact Council when
they have a problem with any of its services, actions,
decisions or other policies.
It commits Council to resolve complaints as quickly as
possible, to learn from complaints by improving services,
and taking steps to ensure matters do not recur.
It treats every complaint on individual merits, through clear
and consistent processes.
It also means that if you have a problem with the manner
in which a complaint has been handled, the option of
independent mediation is available.
Further, if any ratepayer makes a complaint about behav-
iour of compliance staff in the conduct of their enforcement
duties, the matter will be addressed under this policy and
reported to Councillors in due course.
KRAI has worked for a number of years to get this policy
adopted for the benefit of all residents in the municipality.
It is the direct result of significant research by the Association
which has been reported previously by this paper.
The *Kingborough Chronicle* editions of February 16 and 23,
2021 contained articles based on a KRAI report *Oversight,
Governance and Accountability* (OGA) that demonstrated insuf-
ficient self-regulation existed at KC to ensure best practice
oversight and good corporate governance and accountability.
A number of allegations were made in that report relating to
inappropriate behaviour and deeds by senior KC officers.
Those allegations have subsequently not been disputed or
denied by KC management.
A copy of the OGA report can be viewed and downloaded
from KRAI's website.
KRAI would like to acknowledge and thank the Mayor Cr
Paula Wriedt, who in response to the OGA report, championed
the development of this new policy at KC and ensured staff
were trained to handle the new complaints system prior to it
becoming operational.
KRAI was pleased to see that the policy was endorsed
unanimously by all Councillors present at the Council
meeting on January 7.

Protesting and conflicts of interest

In case anyone missed it, the Tasmanian Government has proposed changes to the State's protest laws.

The *Police Offences Amendment (Workplace Protection) Bill 2022* focuses on amending the existing *Police Offences Act* and is currently open for public consultation.

Tasmania's Minister for Resources Guy Barnett MP claimed, "Tasmanians will still be entitled to protest and have their say" however "it is the extremist protests that are becoming more prevalent and we must act now to protect Tasmanians".

Minister Barnett proposes that monetary penalties be increased for various offences, and that Courts be allowed to double penalties, including imprisonment in certain circumstances, including trespass.

However, Independent Member for Nelson, Meg Webb MLC said the best way for any government to prevent an increasing intensity in protest actions is to listen to the concerns of its citizens, be open and transparent, and base decisions on evidence, science and the best interests of the community, not vested interests.

"If this bill comes to Parliament, I will want to see clear evidence of Minister Barnett's claims, I will want a clear explanation of the specific outcomes he's trying to achieve, and I will want to see convincing evidence the bill will actually achieve those intended outcomes.

"The right to protest is a normal, healthy, fundamental part of a free democracy.

"We have all benefitted from progress made in civil rights, gender equality, industrial relations and environmental protection that has come about through the efforts of committed citizens protesting.

"Historically, an escalation of protest action has been an indication of citizens having an increasing sense of urgency and powerlessness," noted Ms Webb.

"If you don't feel heard, you yell louder.

"If you believe there is imminent danger, you act with conviction to prevent it.

"Today, I see a broad cross-section of citizens who want urgent government action on climate change and environmental protection in order to halt the risk of catastrophic or irreparable damage.

"I also see citizens who feel shut out from government decisions due to other, more powerful, interests holding greater sway.

"I don't believe clamping down with harsher penalties and punishments has ever been shown to prevent or reduce protest action – quite the opposite, in fact.

"Any government that tries to curtail democratic rights

or increase punishments on its citizens must have an overwhelming case for doing so," warned Ms Webb.

"I haven't yet heard the government make such a case for this bill."

The *Kingborough Chronicle* spoke to local vet scientist, volunteer and activist Dr Colette Harmsen regarding the proposed law changes on Friday, April 1.

Dr Harmsen said that Tasmania's protest laws are designed to scare people.

"The laws are upside down," Dr Harmsen said.

"The Minister is trying to scare people.

"I've been involved in direct action for a long time.

"I'll probably have to go to jail next time (if the laws are changed).

"Protectors of the environment should not be treated like criminals.

"Those destroying the environment should be the ones being treated as criminals.

"Ever since I studied science at high school in the early 1990s, I have been acutely aware of climate change and the negative impacts humans are having on the environment, and the lack of government action to respond to these impacts," noted Dr Harmsen.

"Here we are 30 years later and nothing has changed. Governments are still refusing to act, industries are still given incentives to pollute, and politicians do not look beyond the next election.

"My mental health, and the mental health of my friends has been persistently adversely affected by the continued lack of action by governments in the face of climate change and environmental destruction.

"I am not alone with this distress.

"MP Guy Barnett continues to push the industry agenda, claiming that environmentalists are threatening workplaces, and must be stopped.

"Barnett states that we are unlawful in our actions and need harsher penalties.

"It does not take a lot of intelligence to recognise that the industry activities considered lawful by Barnett are the exact same activities that are causing environmental damage and climate change," said Dr Harmsen.

"Perhaps it is the law that needs changing and the sensible course of action is to start protecting the environment and to stop outdated and destructive industry activities such as native forest logging and mining."

The *Kingborough Chronicle* asked Tasmania's Minister for Resources Guy Barnett about his justification for the law changes, including:

"Why have the protests become more prevalent?

"What about the mental and emotional health and general psychological safety and wellbeing of young people witnessing the ongoing destruction?

"How can they ignore what they are witnessing and what they know?

"Do you represent Tasmania's youth and do they deserve protection (no further loss) of their environment, health and wellbeing?

"How much money has the Tasmanian Liberal Party received in political donations from the mining sector and forestry sector?

Winter season COVID-19

Winter vaccination

The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) have issued advice recommending a winter dose of COVID-19 vaccine for vulnerable people.

According to the Tasmanian Government, both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are recommended for this winter dose, which should be administered four months after the booster dose.

“Specific groups who should get the winter dose are:

- Tasmanians who are 65 or over;
 - Residents of aged or disability care facilities who are not yet 65;
 - Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people who are 50 or over;
 - Anyone 16 or over who is severely immunocompromised.
- For this group the winter dose is most likely their fifth dose as their primary course was three doses and their booster their fourth dose.

“If you are eligible, the COVID-19 winter dose can be given at the same time as the flu vax. This can be

done with your GP or Pharmacy.

“You can also get your COVID-19 winter dose from any of the State Clinics around Tasmania if you can’t get into your GP or local pharmacy.

“If you walk in to a state clinic rather than a GP or Pharmacy you will need to bring evidence that your last booster was at least four months ago.”

Winter health strategy

Tasmania’s Department of Health has released a 2022 Winter Strategy in preparation for COVID-19 and influenza peaks, should they each or both occur in tandem.

The strategy notes the following measures, among others.

“The Department of Health will conduct testing for influenza alongside COVID PCR testing from a single swab (such as those collected through COVID testing clinics) for people vulnerable to severe illness,” notes the department’s website.

“This will be scaled in response to rates of transmission in the community.

“The COVID@home virtual care program will be expanded to include other respiratory illnesses.

“The GP-led respiratory clinics support assessment and management of respiratory illness and will be crucial for hospital avoidance over the winter period.

“The Commonwealth has confirmed an extension of funding support for GP Respiratory Clinics to 30 September 2022.”

COVID highest among school-aged people

State Health Commander, Kathrine Morgan-Wicks said the escalations were approved for both the Royal Hobart Hospital and Launceston General Hospital following recommendations of the respective Regional Health Emergency Management Teams.

“Tasmania is experiencing a rise in case numbers with the more transmissible BA2 variant becoming the dominant strain of COVID-19,” said Ms Morgan-Wicks.

The State Health Commander said the escalation in levels meant elective surgery activity would be modified “to ensure sufficient capacity for emergency surgery” and staff redeployed, while wards would be reconfigured “to ensure accessibility for COVID-positive patients”.

“Other measures previously in place as part of COVID-19 management escalation level two will remain,” Ms Morgan-Wicks stated.

“The most important protection for Tasmanians to maintain their level of vaccination and not allow their immunity to wane.

“Booster vaccination (third dose) is required three months after a second dose of vaccine, and an additional fourth dose of vaccine is also now recommended for vulnerable groups four months after their booster dose.

“It is also critical for children aged 5-11 to be vaccinated.”

COVID-19 reinfection period

The Tasmanian Government’s COVID-19 website states the re-infection period, between when it is likely people could have COVID-19 again, has increased from 8 weeks to 12 weeks, based on advice from the

Communicable Diseases Network Australia.

“This means, people who are within 12 weeks of the date of their release from isolation after testing positive to COVID-19 have a low risk of being reinfected,” states the Tasmanian Government COVID-19 website.

“People who are within the 12-week period of being released from isolation after having COVID-19 will not be considered close contacts and will not be required to get tested if they have symptoms or to quarantine.”

Huon Valley weekly update

COVID-19 case numbers increased in the Huon Valley during the reporting week ending March 26, with 309 new cases, compared with 172, 97 and 126 new cases recorded for the previous four weeks respectively.

An increased rate of PCR testing was undertaken in the Huon Valley during the reporting week, with 263 PCR tests performed, an increase on the number of tests (161) performed the previous week.

Hobart weekly update

COVID-19 case numbers increased in Hobart during the week ending March 26, with 1131 new cases, compared with 784, 408 and 301 new cases recorded for the previous four weeks respectively.

An increased rate of PCR testing was undertaken in Hobart, with 1368 PCR tests performed, an increase on the number of tests (1105) performed the previous week.

COVID highest for school-aged people

For the week ending March 26, the highest rates of

COVID-19 case notifications in Tasmania were recorded for primary and lower secondary school aged children and teenage age groups.

There were 41 new COVID-19 cases per 1000 children aged 5 to 11 (with a total of 1839 new case notifications for the week) and 38 cases per 1000 children aged 12 to 15 (1002 new cases).

These results follow a trend seen over the previous four weeks presented in the *Weekly Surveillance Report*.

Since the Tasmanian border restrictions were lifted

Tasmania’s *Weekly Surveillance Report* states, “Following the border changes on 15 December 2021, COVID-19 was imported from interstate, and there has been widespread community transmission of COVID-19 in Tasmania.”

“Prior to this date there were 238 cases of COVID-19 recorded in Tasmania, with 13 deaths caused by COVID-19 or with COVID-19 as a contributing factor.”

From 15 December 15 to March 26, COVID-19 has caused or contributed to the deaths of 16 people in Tasmanian hospitals.

died in Tasmanian hospitals since the lifting of border restrictions, six people were unvaccinated, eight people had received two or more doses of vaccines, while the vaccination status of two people are unknown.

Regarding the age categories of people who died in Tasmanian hospitals since the lifting of border restrictions, there have been six deaths of people aged 85 years and above, five deaths in the 60-to-69 years of age category, three in the 80 to 84 age category, and one death in each of the 70-to-79 and 50-to-59 years of age categories.

In the same period there have been a total of 446 hospital admissions of people with COVID-19, including 19 intensive care admissions.

Meanwhile, the Tasmanian Hospitality Association has released its *Hotel Occupancy Report* for February.

The report shows an increase of nearly 7 per cent occupancy from January this year, with around 82 per cent of available rooms filled.

February’s *Hotel Occupancy Report* represents an increase of nearly 14 per cent compared with February 2021.

A bush dance revival

A decades-old tradition is to be revived, with a bush dance planned in the south Channel on Sunday, April 10.

“For years bush dancing was a key feature of the social life in the Channel with regular dances at community halls in Snug, Margate, Kettering and Middleton,” note the South Channel Residents and Ratepayers Association.

“Now following the success of the Middleton on the Green family picnic day in February, which attracted more than 250 people, the South Channel Residents and Ratepayers Association is to stage a bush dance outside at Middleton Hall, with bush band caller Ross Smithard and the musicians Up Jumped Trouble.

“The event will be BYO but food vans will be in atten-

dance and there will be a prize for the best costume.”

South Channel Residents and Ratepayers Association’s Gloria Lonergan said the bush dance continued the theme of bringing the community together and providing an evening of fun and joy during a difficult time living with COVID.

The dancing will take place from 4pm until 7pm at Middleton Hall on Sunday, April 10.

The association plans a program of social events to mark the changing of the seasons with a Biggest Morning Tea on Saturday, June 7, in aid of the Cancer Council of Tasmania.

The Legislative Council by-election follows the resignation of Dr Bastian Seidel on Friday, January 7.

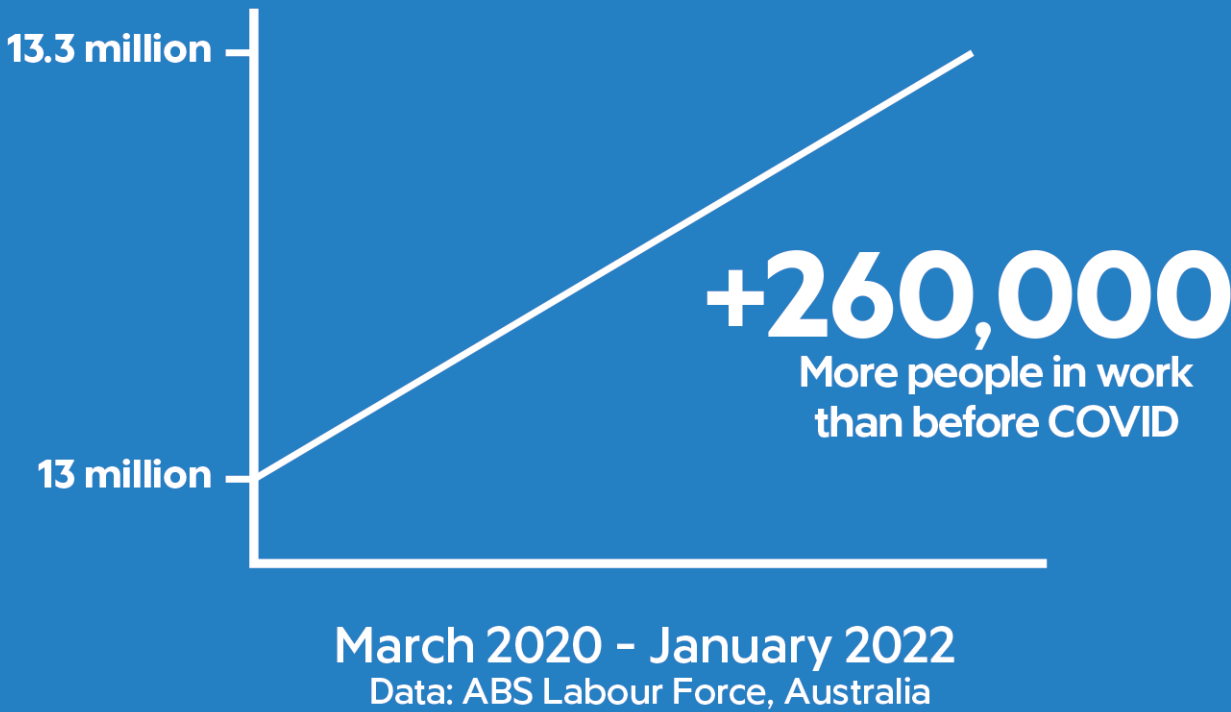

Kindergarten at Mount Carmel

The Kindergarten program at Mount Carmel College is play-based, inquiry-led and child centred.

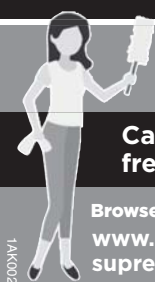

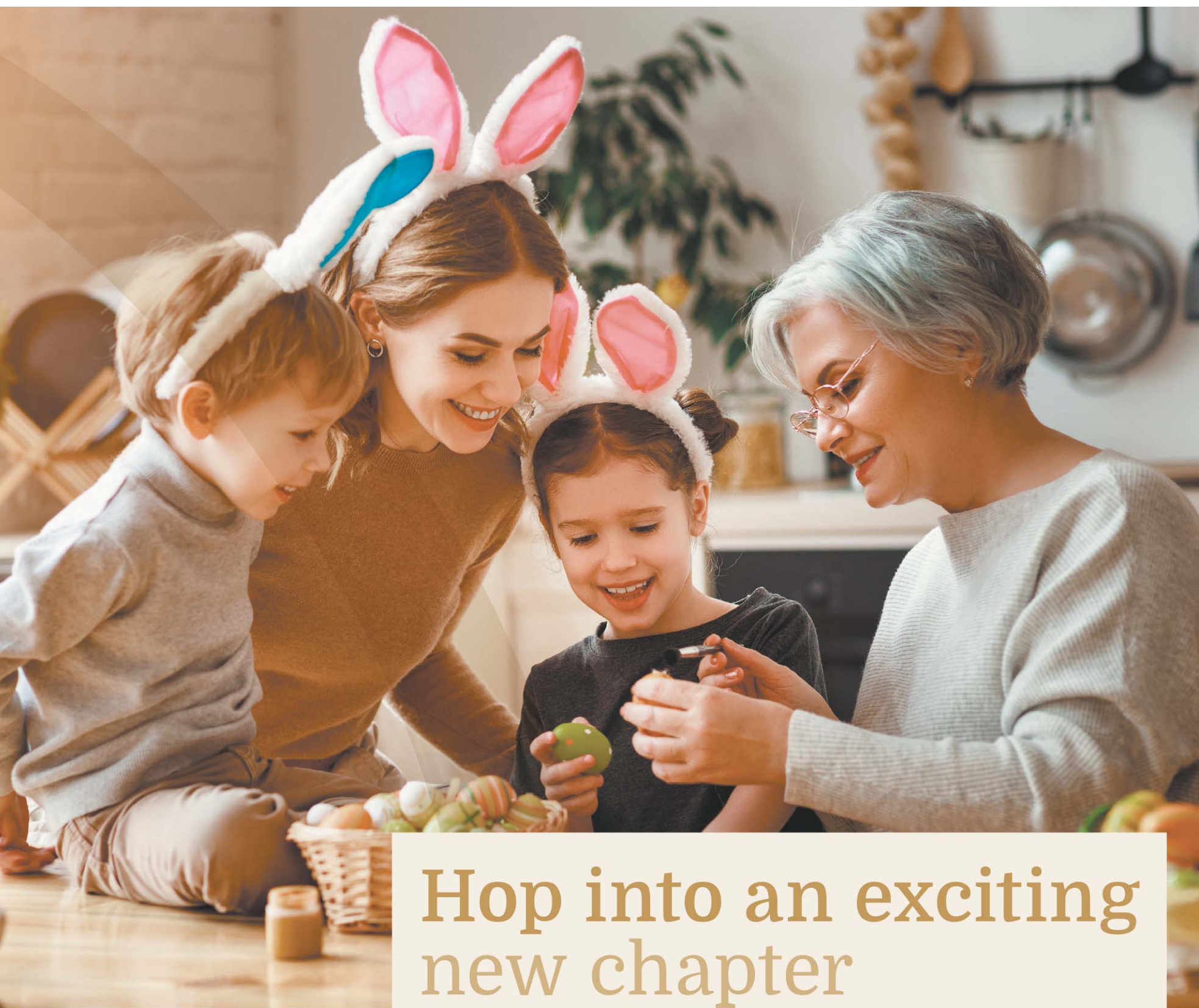
